Burglaries

Since November 2015

- 14 burglaries
 - 9 Residential
 - 3 House construction related
 - 1 Vacant house
 - 1 Resort



Burglaries

- Arrest on 1
- Active leads on another
- 2 at same residence (extensive remodel)
 - 1st to vacant & unsecured house
 - 2nd to storage unit in back yard 2 days later

- Forced entry-6
 - All glass break
- Alarm activations-2
 - Both on Saturdays
 - 7:24 pm & 8:19 pm
 - 3 had alarms but not set




Residential Burglaries





PV Beat 200 v. Phoenix



What are we doing?

What can you do?

- Lock your doors and windows
- Install alarm and video systems
 - Ensure alarm system includes glass break and motion
 - High resolution video
- Ensure all equipment is functioning properly
 - Know how to use and access your systems
- Set alarm every time you leave
 - Create temporary user codes for service personnel
- Schedule a home security survey



What can you do?

- Compile a list of all valuable property with serial numbers, pictures and receipts
 - Reportit.leadsonline.com
- Mark your property
 - Engrave PIN
 - Anti Theft Dots
- Pay attention to your surroundings/neighborhood
- “See something, say something”



“See Something, Say Something”

- General misconceptions about reporting
 - Paradise Valley Police Department is open 24/7
 - Essential services are open on all holidays
 - Your name and address will not appear in the media
 - Someone on your property that’s not supposed to be there is okay
 - Calling 911 is only for extreme cases



Substations

We created substations throughout the Town for quicker response times and higher visibility.

- Beat 300
 - Cherokee Elementary School (Doubletree and 56th St)
- Beat 200
 - PV United Methodist Church (4455 E Lincoln Dr)
- Beat 100
 - Temple Solel (Mockingbird and McDonald)



Crime Trends

- Fraud/Scams
 - “Grandparents” scam
 - IRS scam
 - “Warrant” scam
- What do they have in common
 - Threats of arrest or been arrested (grandparent scam)
 - Use of money wire service or pre-paid card
 - They try to rush you to make a (poor) decision
 - They’re all scams!



Other Crime Trends

- Don't
 - Give out personal information
 - Wire money or give out account numbers from credit cards, bank accounts or pre-paid cards
 - Respond to the email or click on a link in the email
 - Be too trusting
- Do
 - Hang up the phone
 - Record the number or email address the request came from
 - Report it:
 - Police
 - Federal Trade Commission (FTC.gov)
 - Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3.gov)



Safety Tips

- Check to see who is at the front door before opening it to strangers. Require identification from all repair and delivery personnel. If in doubt, check the authenticity of the identification by calling the company before letting the person into your home. Check I.D. through a peephole viewer, if you have one. A wide angle viewer is easy to install and inexpensive.
- All exterior doors should be locked at all times.
- All exterior doors should be secured with a deadbolt lock.
- Windows should be secured with pins or extra locks to discourage prying. They should be locked whenever possible, but particularly at night.
- Trees and shrubs should be trimmed to allow visibility along the perimeter of the house (2 foot/6 foot rule meaning shrubs should be 2 feet in height or lower and 6 feet of clearance and above on trees)
- Timers (both interior and exterior) should be installed to activate lights in your absence.
- If you have an alarm system, make sure it is armed when you leave the house. If your system has the capability, arm the perimeter when you are home.
- All entrances (doors and windows) to your home should be well lit at night.



Safety Tips

- Motion sensor lighting, specifically directed and focused on entry points and vulnerable areas.
- Report suspicious persons or activity in the neighborhood to the police immediately.
- The garage door should be kept down and locked at all times.
- Check your pet door. A small adult can fit through many doors. Keep it locked when not in use.
- Always lock your car. At home, ensure the garage and car are both locked.
- Don't leave things in the interior where they may be on display.
- Keep valuables with you or at home - not in the glove box or under a seat.
- When leaving a building or home make sure someone knows where you are going.
- Always have your keys in hand and ready.
- If possible leave with someone or walk with someone.
- ALWAYS** be aware of your surroundings. **ALWAYS**. And if I didn't mention it – **ALWAYS!**
- Look around, if you see something or someone suspicious, go back inside and call the police.


