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Prevent Drug Addiction and Overdose Deaths

On the heels of largest collection to-date, federal, state and local partners prepare for April event.

Town of Paradise Valley, Arizona – April 12, 2021 – With opioid overdose deaths increasing during the pandemic, the Drug Enforcement Administration announces its 20th Take Back Day is scheduled for April 24th.

At its last Take Back Day in October, DEA collected a record-high amount of expired, unwanted, and unused prescription medications, with the public turning in close to 500 tons of unwanted drugs. Over the 10-year span of Take Back Day, DEA has brought in more than 6,800 tons of prescription drugs. With studies indicating a majority of abused prescription drugs come from family and friends, including from home medicine cabinets, clearing out unused medicine is essential.

On Saturday, April 24th, 2021 from 10am-2pm the Paradise Valley Police Department will again partner as a designated local collection site within the Town. However, a

RX drop box is available to residents within the department's front lobby 24/7/365 beside a newly installed Ammunition Drop Off box. All residents have a role in preventing drug addiction and overdose deaths. Once unused or expired medications are received, it will be disposed of within an incinerator.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. has seen an increase in overdose deaths during the COVID-19 pandemic, with 83,544 Americans overdosing during the 12-month period ending July 1, 2020, the most ever recorded in a 12-month period. The increase in drug overdose deaths appeared to begin prior to the COVID-19 health emergency, but accelerated significantly during the first months of the pandemic.




Image of Rx box within the police front lobby area.

The public can drop off potentially dangerous prescription medications at collection sites which will adhere to local COVID-19 guidelines and regulations in order to maintain the safety of all participants and local law enforcement.

DEA and its partners will collect tablets, capsules, patches, and other solid forms of prescription drugs. Liquids (including intravenous solutions), syringes and other sharps, and illegal drugs will not be accepted.

DEA will continue to accept vaping devices and cartridges at its drop off locations provided lithium batteries are removed.

Helping people dispose of potentially harmful prescription drugs is just one way DEA and its partners are working together to reduce addiction and stem overdose deaths.
